In a season that is often marked more by hurry, activities, stress of a to-do list, and financial strain from gift buying, rather than it is by presence, slowness, and patience; we wanted to provide a guide that would help reorient our minds, our calendars, and hopefully the posture of our hearts this Advent season.

The hope for these next few weeks is to cultivate ways to delight in the hope, joy, peace, and love of Christ through daily reading, weekly reflection, prayers and practices that reorient our hearts and shift the rhythms of our days to meditate on the coming of Christ . . . to prepare Him room.

Before we begin, consider what these next 4 weeks might be like in your home, your calendar, and in your heart.

- In what ways can you refrain from busyness and hurry during Advent?
- What are some things that can help cultivate patience and slowness in your daily and weekly rhythms?
- How can you remove the things in your life currently distracting you from abiding in Christ?
- Are there daily rhythms in your life that you can redeem small moments? (Consider a social media fast, turning your phone off during dinner time, waking early to read, going for a walk after lunch to pray, etc.)
- Practically, how can you prepare your home to live unhurried during Advent? Finish Christmas shopping early, buy less, clean out closets and cabinets to prepare your home before decorating? What can you remove from your mind or your home early to prepare for a slower season?

As you consider preparing Him room, our prayer is that this Advent season leads to rest and refreshment. Only through Jesus the Messiah, can we experience true hope, joy, peace, and love today and in the days ahead.

PRAYER

Father in Heaven, help us to practice slowness, patience, and presence this season. Would you reorient our hearts and minds to celebrate the coming of the King once, and to anticipate in joy His coming once again.

ACTIVITY: ADVENT WREATH & CANDLES

Advent wreaths are of German origin and officially date back to the sixteenth century. The original practice of the Advent wreath was simply focused on the coming light of Christ. The idea is that each week, we add a little more light to our homes and hearts, building anticipation for Jesus's birth. The wreath makes a wonderful centerpiece for your dining table, and lighting the candles can be a special part of your family's tradition each Sunday-perhaps a time to pray or reflect together on Advent. Notice how much brighter your home gets each week as you keep watch for the inbreaking Light of the World.

There are a number of ways to assemble and light your wreath. Traditionally, Advent wreaths consist of four candles: three violet candles and a rose candle. One candle is lit each Sunday in Advent, saving the rose candle for Guadete Sunday on the third week. All white candles can also be used. There is an "expanded" version of the tradition that includes a fifth candle (a white one, also called the Christ candle), which is lit on Christmas Eve.

FOUNDATIONAL PRACTICE: EMBRACING THE GOSPEL THROUGH SILENCE

Perhaps when you light your advent candle each week, take a few minutes for reflective silence. Remind each other that the people of God waited a long time for Jesus and that we are still waiting for him to return. Quietly wait for him together for a few minutes. Talk about what was hard about the waiting-and perhaps enjoy a treat afterward, a reminder that good things come to those who wait!



"On earth as it is in heaven..." For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

ISAIAH 9:6

We celebrate the birth of Jesus, remembering the baby in the manger. But the true celebration is not in merely the baby born to a virgin, but that God came to us, in the flesh. Immanuel, God with us. The incarnation. The Prince of Peace left his heavenly dwelling to bend down into humanity and be with us. Peace moved towards us, into the chaos, the brokenness, the hostility, not away. He enters in and bends low so that we would know peace and exalt the Prince of Peace. He moves into humanity so we would receive peace for eternity. He reaches down from on high so we would lift His name high. The God most High descends to the depths of humanity, entering brokennes, becoming broken, so that we experience Shalom. Peace, born as a baby, comes to us as the Word made flesh (Jn.1:14), to be with us. God incarnate, Immanuel, becomes our everlasting peace.

Toy Drive

Collect new/gently used toys to give to those in need

Prayer Cards

Another way to bring peace, pray for those you know are hurting this season. Write out a prayer card for 5 people and pray one each day during advent.

Calls and Written Notes

Think of those on the margins (Widows, single moms, senior living) and write cards or make calls.

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INTENTIONALLY PURSUE COMMUNITY BY SPREADING THE JOY!

Baking Day: This week consider spreading JOY to your friends, family, and neighbors with a baking day. Invite loved ones over to bake, swap recipes, and enjoy time together. Wrap up baked goods and deliver them to friends, coworkers, and neighbors throughout the week.

Recipes to try: Divinity Candy (From Taste of Home)

What Is Divinity Candy? Divinity gets its name because it tastes, well, divine. The nougat-like candy is made with egg whites, sugar, and corn syrup. Divinity is famous for being finicky: Experienced home cooks know you can't make it on a day with high humidity, as it needs dry air to set properly.

Divinity Candy Ingredients

You'll need just six ingredients to make this old-fashioned divinity recipe: Sugar: This traditional divinity recipe starts with 2 cups white sugar.

Corn syrup: Make sure you use light, not dark, corn syrup.

Water: Use ½ cup cold water.

Egg whites: Beaten egg whites are key in light, airy divinity.

Vanilla: A teaspoon of vanilla extract enhances the overall flavor.

Walnuts: Walnuts are optional, but they add a welcome crunch. You can also use pecans.

You'll also need waxed paper and a candy thermometer.

How to Make Divinity Candy

It's actually quite easy to make divinity at home — you just need a good recipe (that's where we come in!). You'll find the step-by-step recipe below.

- 1. Heat the sugar, corn syrup, and water until the sugar dissolves. Bring to a boil.
- 2. Cook without stirring until the syrup reaches 250 degrees.
- 3. Beat the egg whites until stiff peaks form. Slowly pour in the hot syrup.
- 4. Add the vanilla until the mixture holds its shape. Fold in the nuts, if using.
- 5. Dollop onto waxed paper and let sit until firm. Tips: ·

On humid days, use 1 tablespoon less water. If the mixture becomes too stiff for an electric mixer, add a few drops of hot water.

How to Store Divinity

Store the divinity at room temperature in an airtight container for up to two weeks. Make sure the environment is not humid, as excess moisture in the air will make the candy sticky.
